
Endangered – US Endangered Species Act of 1973

Population estimate today = 100-180







Range of Florida Panther




Panther Range - Past, Present, and Potential






3 Foot Sea Level Rise





Chances of successful recovery will be the greatest if the panther is able to travel north on its own and resettle its historic home.










Florida Wildlife Corridor Expedition

Everglades to Okefenokee 1,000 miles in 100 days








